What Rural Transit Operators Do

- Meet Service Demands
 - Rural Demand Response
 - Elderly & Persons with Disabilities
 - Workforce
 - Medical (VA Clinics, Dialysis, Regional Specialists)
- Safety & Efficiency
- Secure Funding

Doing More with Less!

- Demand is growing in every category
- Funding is constrained
 - More agencies applying for same dollars
 - Restrictions on 5310 use (preventive maintenance historically)
- Grants eliminated
 - JARC
 - New Freedom
 - Greyhound



There is only ONE way to do this...

 - Public & Private Higher Education
 - Training Facilities

 - Senior Living Facilities















How We Built Partnerships?

- Reaching out and building awareness
 - Awareness of who we are
 - Awareness of what we do
 - Awareness of the need for transportation
- Everyone is busy with their own work already. It is up to <u>US</u> to show them how working together will benefit their clients and increase efficiencies
- We meet people all of the time that do not know what TRAX is or the extent of what we do
- Many think it is only medical transportation
- In the end it is all about building

relationships and TRUST



Partnering with Health & Human Service Agencies

Many have "Transportation Dollars"

- Area Agency on Aging (MOU to transport elderly throughout the 9 County Service Area)
 - To Meal Centers
 - To Medical Appointments
 - To Shopping
- Opportunities (MOU for transport to Day Programs provide broad range of developmental & support services in Texarkana)
 - Provide to senior day programs
- Center for the Blind
- DARS
 - Buy passes for Transit Services











- Coordinated with Workforce Solutions of Northeast Texas
 - What WE did:
 - Negotiated 24 hour/day service with local taxi company & entered into MOU
 - MOU secured transportation for $\frac{1}{2}$ of the normal rate for the taxi and waived the additional per mile charge within urban areas
 - Negotiated greatly reduced rates in rural areas
 - Reduced fares became part of the match for the Grant
 - Transported participants to
 - Take their children to child care
 - Job interviews
 - Their actual job
 - Monitored that participants actually were searching/working when they reached the destination
 - Ensured that funds were actually used for transportation (previously Workforce Solutions simply provided \$ directly to participants)
 - What Workforce Solutions of Northeast Texas did:
 - Screened and referred participants
 - Provided monthly report of the staff time that provided "in-kind" match for the Grant



New Freedom-another great example

Coordinated with Taxi to provide ADA "Above & Beyond" Currently Provided Transportation

- What WE did:
 - Negotiated MOU to provide extended service beyond normal demand response hours (evening and weekend) with local taxi company
 - MOU secured transportation for ½ of the normal rate for the taxi and waived the additional per mile charge
 - Reduced rates became part of the match for the Grant



Partnering with Educational Facilities

- We provided transportation for Northeast Texas Community College students thru an MOU with college
- We are partnering with Paris Junior College for referrals of Students with Disabilities & elderly students to the new fixed-route in Paris





Partnering with Government Agencies

- Coordinate paratransit for Texarkana Urban Transit District (TUTD)
 - TUTD operates the fixed route service in Texarkana Urban Area
 - TRAX provides the paratransit service thru an MOU with TUTD
 - Provides approximately 900 trips/month
 - To medical appointments
 - Work
 - Shopping





Creating a Win-Win Paris, TX

- The Ultimate Partnership
 - Health & Human Service Agencies
 - United Way of Lamar County
 - Lamar County Human Resources
 - Salvation Army
 - Paris-Lamar County Health District
 - The Children's Advocacy Center of Paris
 - New Hope Center of Paris (women's shelter)
 - Lamar County Veterans Service Office
 - Government City of Paris
 - Educational Facility Paris Junior College
 - (Private Business) Texas Oncology, Primary Care Associates of Paris & Atmos Energy

Creating a Win-Win Paris, TX

- How to transition from demand response to a fixed-route with paratransit?
 - Planning completed with many stakeholders involved
 - Health & Human Service Agencies, Paris Junior College and Private Businesses really stepped up
 - Executed Letters of Commitment to screen & refer clients ("in-kind" match)
 - Committed to Purchase tokens/passes each month
 - Got on-line surveys completed
 - Circulated Petitions of Support
 - Used Social Media
 - Applying for 5310 Grant funds to make fixed-route ADA accessible







Creating a Win-Win Paris, TX —Partnership Makes it Work!

- Approached the City of Paris
 - They are providing:
 - Engineering & Planning staff time (survey, design, TxDOT coordination)
 - Use of their Sign Shop
 - Public Works staff time to install curb-cuts, concrete walks, pads & shelters
 - Provide concrete and sign materials at cost (\$25,000 savings)
 - This equates to \$68,000 in staff time for "in-kind" match
